# Presidents Report NCSG

This year's convention at the Mohegan Sun is a special one marking the 30<sup>th</sup> anniversary of NCSG. It is shaping up to be one of the best-attended conventions in the history of NCSG and will definitely be remembered as a very special convention by all attendees. I am very happy to announce there will be at least 25 International Colleagues present to help us celebrate this milestone in the history of NCSG.

Over the years we have made much progress to identify what we need to be as a trade association and clarified our goals moving into the future. We have accomplished many goals this past year by bringing more benefits to members than we have ever had in previous years. An even bigger accomplishment is we have developed systems through the combined efforts of the board, staff, and volunteers to proactively increase our membership.

Last year going into the Louisville convention we saw a net increase of 95 members over the previous year representing a 9.7% increase. Coming into the Mohegan convention our total number of member companies is at 1,112 and with their employees represents 3,374 professionals. This past year we also saw a 21% increase in supplier Members, a very good sign of opportunities for our trade show and support for our trade.

Two years ago we introduced a much needed liability insurance program to our members at a time when many were experiencing problems with retaining their current insurance carriers. In short span of only two years there are almost 300 members who are using this benefit that in most instances offers more complete coverage than what they had in place before. We are fast approaching the number of participants where it becomes even more attractive for insurance carriers to bid on a group our size, and we are already seeing a decrease in insurance premiums to members.

This year's convention will be one of the largest attended in NCSG's 30-year history. There are many reasons why this convention is taking shape so well. One of those is the board had a much larger role with input on seminar offerings at this years convention early in the planning stages. Through our membership surveys we know that educational seminars are very important to members and the number one consideration for them attending our convention. Staff does a very good job lining up presenters for our convention and the mix of seminar idea input from members, board, and staff is something we need to keep working together on for future conventions.

One of the responsibilities of any trade association is the recruitment of new people into their trade group. As our membership matures this is something we need to be more aware of and seek out entry-level opportunities to perpetuate the continued growth of the chimney sweeping trade. This year we will be introducing our Chimney Sweep Academy through a pilot program to high schools in Indianapolis. The results from this pilot program will help to shape future offerings around the country for following years.

Each year we are facing more government regulation issues on all levels; federal, state and local governing bodies. Our Government Affairs Committee continues to establish networks through EPA and HPBA on the national level representing sweeps and the issues facing our trade. It's through these networks and the Legalert system that proposed state and local legislative issues are identified to encourage a call to action for local sweeps to get involved and present their concerns before code making bodies. This is something we need to make sweeps more aware of through articles in Sweeping and use of our member discussion list for calls to action when proposed legislation is identified for swift action by local sweeps. The best way we can assist sweeps is by making action packets available to them on how to address legislators through a grass roots effort and a list of networking contacts on the local level in their area. This will require member volunteers to step forward and be ready to lead the charge in their localities. What's in it for sweeps is the opportunity to effect change by addressing their legislators and the continuance of being able to apply their craft. This vigil must be embraced by sweeps across the nation to deliver the message that homeowners have a right to be able to burn responsibly with the latest technology available without governments dictating what type of fuel they will have to burn. Our Government Affairs Committee will become the go to source for sweeps seeking assistance for the many issues we face as a trade.

Looking towards our Long Range Planning meeting next month, we need to identify how we can provide even more benefits and progressive services to our members. By making members more successful in their businesses, NCSG becomes stronger and able to give back even more to its members.

### National Chimney Sweep Guild Board of Directors Meeting Report of the Executive Director April 17, 2007

Innovation is the new theme for the NCSG Annual Convention and Trade Show, and I think that's a very fitting description of the evolution of the National Chimney Sweep Guild over the past couple of years. As Debbie Cornelius will attest, a contributing factor to the successful growth of the Guild these past 16 months has been from former members who are telling us they are coming back because they now see significantly improved value in membership.

Since our renewed membership campaign kicked off in December of 2005 with our new *Sweeps Advantage* member benefits program, membership has grown by 14.5%. Equally exciting is the fact that our Supplier Membership has grown by more than 34% during that same time period.

It is also worth noting that in 2006 we began tracking our "employee members" more closely; that is, the total number of employees represented by our member companies. IN 2006, our 1066 member companies represented an additional 1954 employees – or a total of 3020 professionals. By comparison, in 2007 our 1112 member companies represent and additional 2262 employees – or a total of 3374 professionals. These numbers are significant in that, while they do not have a direct financial correlation for NCSG, they do represent the larger sphere of influence that NCSG is generating. 2007 reflects an 11.7% increase in that sphere over this same time period last year.

A significant factor continuing to contribute to our success is the NCSG liability insurance program offered through Security Group International and Stratus Insurance. Unveiled in 2005, we have seen consistent growth in the program since its inception, having had as many as 301 written policies to date.

According to Security Group International, based on past performance and year-to-date activity, total premiums for 2007 are projected to range between \$700,000 and \$725,000.

The other primary component getting attention in the *Sweeps Advantage* program is our supplier coupons. During the past year we have added 9 new suppliers to the program and 16 new coupons/member offers. With the increase in our Supplier Members, Debbie anticipates another substantial increase in participants and offers throughout 2007. Our challenge at this point is simply increasing the awareness of the incredible value of this program among the membership of the Guild.

Over the past few months we have also added some additional benefits to our Sweeps Advantage program...

- **LABORCHEX** Employee background screening that complies with federal laws and regulations at significant price discounts;
- **DHL Shipping** A benefit initially requested by our Supplier Members, this program represents customized discounts with DHL, Roadway, Yellow Transportation, USF Companies, New Penn and UPS Supply Chain Solutions;
- Best Western International NCSG members receive up to a 10% discount on over 4,200 hotels in 80

countries;

• Electronic Clearing House, Inc (ECHO) – Brand new and being introduced at Mohegan Sun, this is an exciting new program that brings understandable and affordable credit card processing services to our members, regardless of the size and type of their company. Members have been asking for this type of benefit, and ECHO will be represented at our Trade Show to answer questions and start signing members up.

We are expecting a record attendance at this year's convention and trade show. Our previous record was 610 attendees in Myrtle Beach 2004. As of April 6<sup>th</sup>, we already had 612 registered for Mohegan. In the past four years, we have not had less than 45 additional onsite registrations, so we on pace to well-exceed 650 total attendees this year.

2007 will also mark a record year for our trade show. Our previous record was again at Myrtle Beach 2004, where 56 exhibitors occupied 76 booths. This year at Mohegan we are expecting 67 exhibitors in 99 booths.

The staff has begun sifting through the data collected via our 2007 member survey. The results will be reviewed by the full board heading into our annual planning meeting in May. We had an 18.5% increase in our total number of responses over last year's survey (approximately 17% of our voting membership responded). The geographic breakdown of those responding looked like this:

Perhaps one of the more encouraging initial statistics gleaned from the survey was that 60.5% of those responding indicated that their gross income for 2006 increased compared to 2005. The average increase in gross income over the previous year was 18.64%. Of those who reported a decrease in 2006, the average decrease was 7.6%.

Between now and the May planning meeting, the survey results will be filtered by various demographics and more deeply analyzed so we have more meaningful data to work with in terms of identifying member priorities and trends.

The staff is looking forward to a great convention at Mohegan Sun. Congratulations to our new directors, and thank you to our retiring directors for your tireless work and dedication toward the ongoing success of the National Chimney Sweep Guild and your trade.

# **Region 5 Director Report**

#### WISCONSIN

At the Wisconsin Guild's January meeting there was a NFI wood Certification seminar given by Dave Pomeroy. It was well attended and had a few sweeps that traveled from outside of the region to take the seminar as well. The summer meeting will be a workshop at a YMCA camp in the northern part of the state with hands on repairs to the existing fireplaces in the cabins. One of the activities will be installation of cultured stone on the interior face of some fireplaces.

Business activity for sweeping, repairs, and relining last year were very close to the previous years activity with retail sales lagging behind activity in 2005. The first quarter of this year started out on the slower side. Unseasonable warm temperatures a few weeks ago helped many to get some repair & relining work done before the temperatures went back to a winter pattern this week. Over the next couple of weeks spring temperatures and rains have most optimistic on the service side of business. Most are still uncertain what to expect with retail sales this year. The housing market for new and existing homes is currently in a slump across the state.

#### MINNESOTA

Demand for sweeping, repair, and liners were strong in the fourth quarter of 2005 continuing into January. Many sweeps attended the WI Guild meeting in Wisconsin Dells for the NFI wood seminar and test in January. Almost as many sweeps from MN attended as WI sweeps for this seminar. The weather pattern had most reporting that it was hard to get out to do outside work with the colder temperatures. Duluth just experienced 12 inches of new snow this week, but warmer temperatures are expected soon to permit outside work to get accomplished.

#### NORTH & SOUTH DAKOTA

Sweeping held strong through the fourth quarter with retail sales in a slump like most of the region. Business activity is starting to pick up with warmer weather and homeowners getting outside to asses how their homes faired over the winter.

#### IOWA

Companies with retail sales experienced lower sales than the previous year. The service side of the chimney market was more stable and in line with the previous years numbers.

Most were optimistic about this years retail opportunities and expect 2007's numbers to be better than last fall.

#### NEBRASKA

The Nebraska state guild is small but stays active promoting CSIA certified sweeps. The service side of business was slightly down to even from the previous year. Most are finally able to get out and start doing exterior repair & relines moving into spring.

#### **GENERAL CONDITION**

Right after labor day business activity was strong in most all areas with sweeping, repair, relines, and retail sales. Towards the end of September the national media reported energy costs were anticipated to be lower than the previous year and really took a punch out of the fall market compared with backlogs from the prior year at the same time. Most in the region relied heavily on their sweep/service side of the business to offset slower than anticipated retail sales. No one really knows what to expect this year with retail sales, but are optimistic about early buy incentives from manufacturers. Most were in agreement the companies that concentrated on the service and repair side were able to report better numbers than those with larger retail operations. Over the past six months there has been increased interest in retail hearth shops looking to supplement lagging sales and competition in the new housing market through sweeping and service. A common question I heard from hearth shops was, "Can someone really make a profit from servicing chimneys and what do I need to get started."

No additional information is available regarding the disbanding of The Kansas Guild of Chimney Professionals and their goal to donate organizational funds to the National Guild.

Further efforts to contact any member of the Texas Guild were unsuccessful and the effort has been halted. No State organizations exist in Colorado, New Mexico, or Oklahoma.

Here are the current membership figures for Region 7:

There are 38 CSIA Certified Chimney Sweeps in the region.

We have had several new members, but unfortunately have lost almost as many.

The OCSA will be holding it's annual May Day Conference in Portland next month and I am involved in some of the planning. The dates will be May 3-6, 2007 and it will be held at McMenamins Edgefield where we've had it a couple of times previously. This is a great venue converted from an old county work farm to a bed & breakfast with amazing artwork throughout the complex which features a movie theater, 18 hole golf course, several pubs, a fine dining restaurant, a winery, a brewery, a distillery, and much more. Dave Pomeroy is one of the slated speakers so it should be a great program and will also include a guided to of Omni Laboratory for some education on the testing and listing of products.

A bill to reinstate the requirement that a chimney sweep have a contractor license put together by OCSA members has passed the Senate and is now in the House where there is no known opposition. It is anticipated that this will pass and put back into law. The OCSA believes licensing should be required to protect homeowners from companies without appropriate insurance and worker's compensation coverage.

Most companies in the region reportedly are experiencing a very good year for repairs and are booked out for several weeks. Sweeping is taking its seasonal downturn but there does not seem to be the overall decline in business that other regions are experiencing, at least in the more populated areas.

# **Region 8 Director Report**

April 2007

Currently, member sweeps total 2 in the state of Hawaii, 4 in Arizona, 3 in Nevada, 4 in Utah and 89 in California. That's a total of 102 region eight members. That's a one member increase over the 101 members I reported on last March. California currently has the second largest number of NCSG members from any one state! I feel and have been told that the new member benefits are a huge reason for the increase and retention of members in this region.

The "Golden State Chimney Sweep Guild" remains the only state guild within region 8. The GSCSG is holding its 27<sup>th</sup> annual convention and trade show in Buena Park, CA this July. There will be four days of education available to sweeps from all over the country.

Business was down across the board for region 8 this past year. Many say that the increased awareness of the need to have hearth products serviced and inspected has increased the inspection portion of their business throughout the region. Many more home inspectors are recommending NFPA-211, level II inspections as a way to limit there liability in real estate transactions. This is due in large part to many within the industry that frequent the monthly meetings of the home inspectors in many different areas of the region.

I will continue my efforts to increase membership within the region and make myself available to the members.

# **NCSG Supplier Director Report**

#### April 2007 BOD meeting

Now is not the best of time for hearth and chimney suppliers. They face the after affects of a difficult 4<sup>th</sup> quarter of 2006 and 1<sup>st</sup> quarter of 2007, dramatically increasing stainless steel prices, a soft new construction market, and in some case hyper-competitive conditions. To elaborate, the late arrival of winter had a tremendous negative effect on sale, leading to excess inventories, layoffs, and tightening of budgets. To compound this situation, stainless steel prices are rapidly increasing. Some venting manufacturers have already announced price increases, in some cases over 10 percent, and most others surely will follow their lead. I would not be surprised to see even more price increases later in the year as projections right now are for stainless steel to go up even more. Chimney Sweeps should prepare themselves for these price increases and pass them one. Venting product production and distribution continues to be extremely competitive. There is some good news. A late blast of winter combined with high oil prices should lead to a rebound later in 2007.

I'm pleased to report, even with some difficult business conditions, booth sales for this convention are strong. The feedback I've received from suppliers indicates a great deal of excitement for this convention. Rightfully so, they expect great attendance numbers and a full tradeshow. That excitement is tempered by their disapproval of the added expense of not being able to bring in their booths without purchasing assistance from SER Exposition Services. This is an unfortunate situation that our suppliers will run into more often as our convention grows and must be located at larger convention venues.

I am disappointed to report use of the member discount coupon book is less than expected. While the program has tremendous perceived value for our members, is seems only a small portion are taking advantage of it. While suppliers are not complaining about this situation, I think it is something the board and our staff should know about.

# **Membership Committee Report**

### April 2007

As of the time of this report, we have approximately 1,021 voting members of the NCSG. This number is up nearly 13% from the 907 voting members we left Texas with in March of 2005 and more than a 3% increase following Louisville a year ago. As for Dues paying members, we have approximately 1,105, this is an increase of better than 14% over the 970 in San Antonio and 3% again over the 2006 convention. I am encouraged with the progress but know we have room for additional growth as well. I will come to the meeting in Connecticut with updated totals provided by the staff.

Our membership message now packs quite a punch. The coupon program, liability insurance, CSIA discounts and the many other services we provide, save NCSG members many times the cost of the membership per year. We shouldn't stop here.

We must continue to:

1) Expand the benefits of NCSG membership.

2) Find new ways to deliver more than is expected by the members, to the members.

3) Explore new ways keep the NCSG membership message in front of the non member and achieve a minimal attrition rate that is significantly lower than the association average.

Over the last two years, the membership committee as it previously existed, prior to the San Antonio convention, has been dissolved. The critical task of personal contact with the membership as well as the task of personal contact with the non- member sweeps has been shifted to the staff. This was done out of respect to the limited time resources of the volunteer committee members to:

1) Respond to the expired members in a timely manner.

2) Make contact with members during the business day, during the busy season.

3) Deliver a uniform message, have a good understanding of the multiple benefits of NCSG membership and articulate them to the member.

The development of the coupon program and staff involvement has been key, to the benefit package that already existed. Aside from the progress made in making liability insurance available to sweeps, technical support, CSIA education discounts and numerous other benefits, the coupon program put the package over the top. Any business in America that offers chimney sweeping as a service is loosing money not being a member of the NCSG.

The development of the marketing program has been and will continue to be the foundation of membership retention and expansion. This program currently consists of

direct mail. I would like to see the delivery of these direct mailing pieces included with our vender partner customer mailings. I would also like to see even more vender participation in the coupon program.

This has been a productive year for the expansion of NCSG membership. I look forward to the continued expansion of the benefits and number of members. It has been an honor to serve the NCSG membership this last year.

# Internet Committee Report April 2007

**<u>CSIA</u>**: As you no doubt have heard the CSIA site passed the half million visitor mark this year. This is fabulous news as it shows the organization is finally becoming a serious player on a national scale, and our Internet presence is a large part of that overall success. As I write this report the site is being tweaked to be more consumer friendly, and other improvements are always on the radar screen.

This is an opportunity beyond anything we had hoped for not many years ago but is by no means the end of the story. I hope the CSIA board will continue to support the efforts of the staff along these lines and strategize how to integrate all the organization's efforts to complement this very important piece of the puzzle.

**NCSG:** The NCSG website is in the process of a much needed complete overhaul similar to what was done to the CSIA site a few years back. While the present site served us well for a starting point, it has been up and just patched together for ten years, which is an eon in Internet Time. There is a lot of potential for this site mainly in the area of member services, and we intend to bring it back as the one, central point of information and reference for all chimney sweeps.

This is a very labor intensive process and Melissa is spending as much time and energy on it as she has available considering that convention is also taking up much of her time. She is heading this project and again, I hope the board will support her fully while she takes this on.

The design has been selected, the provider is selected, navigation has been vastly improved, and the process is finally well on the way. There should be teasers available at convention. The anticipated Go-Live date for the full site is mid May.

**EMAIL LIST:** The number of members on the email list continues to grow in great part due to recruiting efforts by Outreach Coordinator Debbie Cornelius. She has sent me over 30 people that asked to put on the list in the last two weeks alone.

While the list is occasionally contentious and certainly has its ups and downs, I believe it continues to be a very valuable, up front member benefit that really helps the membership feel plugged directly into the organization. It also continues to be an almost immediate road to needed technical questions with answers, that saves Royal and Ashley countless hours dealing with members every month.

It has been interesting to watch the list participation evolve. Some of the older, more experienced sweeps are backing away from it to some degree as they see the same questions surface every so often, and they find the information on the list less valuable to them as they and their businesses mature. I think it's very important that we keep in mind that a large part of the audience is the new members and less experienced sweeps that find it to be a gold mine of good information. This is much the same as the balancing act for the Guild at large as we try to service both the older sweeps and the newer generation of less experienced members. As much as possible, I would like to see us try to keep the experienced guys around and the board member participation high so can continue to present real value to some of our newer members.

There is still the occasional round of discussion about moving it to a bulletin board format. After careful consideration, and as Internet Committee Chairman, I hope the board will not decide to go

this route. In spite of the occasional headache the "push" format email system causes, it is by far the best way to serve the membership when all the ramifications are analyzed.

**IN CONCLUSION:** Overall I think the Guild's internet presence is doing all we had originally hoped it would and has surpassed our expectations on many fronts. With the complete overhaul of the NCSG site I think we will be in good stead all the way around.

My direct participation is substantially less than it has been in the past. Staff has taken over the websites to large degree and they are doing a great job with them. Please continue to give them your full support. My duties are mostly advisory though I continue to administer the email list on a daily basis.

The loss of Gerry Egelston will be felt by us all. He was an incredibly valuable member of the internet team and a good friend to many. We will do our best to plug the hole left by Gerry, but there will be no replacing him.

# NFPA 31 Report


